

Elevator Music are to be played inside an elevator, reflecting on the journey the elevator and its travellers goes through. The numbers in Elevator 2 refers to the number of floors of a spesific elevator, but feel free to interprete the numbers to any other number of floors, depending on which elevator the piece are to be played in.

The pieces can be played with any instrument with the range C1-D#3 (concert pitch)

Durata: Depends on the elevator

(minimum length: 2 minutes)

ELEVATOR MUSIC - PLAYING INSTRUCTIONS

ELEVATOR 1:

PART 1: Start playing when the elevator door is closing at the 1st/23rd floor

PART 1: Play from the beginning regardless from which floor the elevator starts

The performer has to adjust the tempo of the music so that it fits the time
the elevator uses between starting and stopping

If the elevator stops before the performer has finished Part 2,

the performer has to cut between phrases and move to Part 3

PART 3: Play when the elevator stops

In part 3 the tempo is approximately 70 Bpm

Cut between phrases if the elevator starts to move before Part 3 is finished

PART 4: This part follows Part 3 when the elevator stops at the end of its journey, at the 1st or 23rd floor

The dynamics are entirely the decision of the performer

ELEVATOR 2:

The first and last parts relate to whether the elevator is at the start or end of its journey
When the elevator starts at the 1st floor, play the part at the top of the page
When the elevator starts at the 23rd floor, play the part at the bottom of the page
Start playing when people enters the elevator, and continue playing until the elevator starts to move
Repeat the part if necessary, and break between phrases if the elevator starts to move in the middle of the part

When the elevator reaches the 23rd floor, play the part at the bottom of the page When the elevator reaches the 1st floor, play the part at the top of the page

The other 5 parts relate to which floors the elevator passes

These parts are to be played between the designated floors, also if the elevator stops at one of these floors

Repeat the parts as many times as neccesary, and cut between phrases if the elevator passes

before the part is finished


The tempoes are entirely the decision of the performer, though it shouldn't be slower than 50 Bpm The dynamics written at the beginning of each part are meant to work as a guide to the performer Between the different floors the dynamics should always be gradually changing, depending on whether the elevator is moving upwards or downwards

It's up to the performer how loud the forte should be, and how quiet the piano should be The music shold be flowing as continously as possible during the ride, so the performer must be very careful with the pauses between the parts and phrases

The performer is free to interprete the music in any way he/she finds suitable for the performance, the only exception is the order of the parts


ELEVATOR 1

BIORN BOLSTAD SKIELBRED - 2008




ELEVATOR I
